In the business world a satisfied customer and a positive testimonial can be powerful marketing tools and the most meaningful compliment for your services. However, at Holston Home we pray that we could be out of business because that would mean all children are safe and thriving in healthy families where the only trauma is related to a school age crush gone bad or a poor grade on a biology test. A few weeks ago we received a call that left us with mixed emotions due to these competing goals.

Lance, a young man that we cared for several years ago, called and asked us to help his little brother. Lance left us and has done well as a young adult. He went to work as a corrections officer and recently became concerned for his younger brother, Ethan. The home environment had deteriorated and their grandmother was trying to raise Ethan. We also learned Ethan was abused by his physician. Here was one more example where trust was violated, and an adult had let him down. He was angry at life, and it showed at school and in his grandmother's home. Lance called us and shared how much he had learned here and how loved he felt. He wanted those same things for his brother, and Holston Home was the only one he knew that would not let Ethan down. Our admission counselor cried when she hung up the phone, touched by Lance's gratitude and broken-hearted over Ethan's situation.

Ethan is here now and is feeling safe and cared for. His grandmother was overjoyed when he arrived. She knew she wasn't able to care for him but told us that she had been praying that he could come here like Lance. She has been visiting Ethan regularly and he is doing very well. He joined Holston Home's basketball team and has volunteered with a group of our kids to serve at the local animal shelter.



It is an incredible honor for God to entrust young lives to our care. I'm reminded of what Jesus said, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick." That is why He came and it is why He has called Holston Home to continue His work. We are a team of "doctors", and you are part of this team. Without your faithful prayers and gifts, we couldn't do what we do. I imagine that our Heavenly Father also looks forward to this broken world going out of business so that the hurts of children are no more. Until that time may we remain steadfast, as adults that young people like Ethan and Lance can count on. Thank you for being a part of this healing ministry!

THE JOY OF FOSTERING

Holston Home is always looking for people who want to make a difference in the life of a child by becoming foster parents. Mary Jane Rush is one of our heroes for the love and care she gave to children as a foster parent for more than 21 years. She and her husband began fostering in 1982 after she toured Holston Home and heard of the need for quality foster parents. They started fostering their first child only a few months later. Rush cares about the safety and well-being of all children but has always felt a strong pull towards infants. “It’s like God placed a magnet in my heart for babies,” she said.

Rush was 47 years old and her husband was 50 when they took in their first child. They cared for roughly 60 children before their last foster child left in 2003. Most of the children they took in were under the age of three. Rush said that it was always painful when a child left her home because she loved them like they were her own. But knowing that they were going to a good family made it easier.

“It hurt to let them go but I knew it was what was best for them,” said Rush. “Look what I would have missed if I had decided to not care for them while I had the chance.”

Rush loved every foster child as if they were her own but always kept the future adoptive parents in mind. This is why she took many pictures of each child from the day they entered her home to the day they left to meet their adoptive parents

and made a photo album for herself and one for the parents. She also included a letter about their new child, about the things he or she liked and things they did. Rush said that in those days the foster parents and adoptive parents had no contact with each other, but that she insisted on meeting the people who were adopting the children she kept because she wanted to make sure they were going to good homes and she hoped to keep in touch with the children. She is still in touch with 10 of the children that she fostered.

“They’re grown up now and have their own lives, so we don’t get to talk as much as we used to,” said Rush. “But they always send me a Christmas card to tell me they’re thinking of me.”

Rush said that she thanks God every day for Holston Home because they change countless lives of children and families. Rush looks back at her time fostering children with fondness and love.

After fostering for more than two decades, Rush decided it was time to allow others the blessing. Rush and her family have never regretted taking in and loving children in need. They only wish they could have helped more.

“We were more blessed than the babies,” Rush said, her eyes shining with love.

As I listened to her, I thought how wonderful it would be **if every Ambassador would speak to their congregation**



If the Old Oak Tree Could Talk

There is a tree on the property that once was the “old campus” that is more than 115 years old. It was there when the Orphanage and Industrial School – now Holston United Methodist Home for Children – was established by Elizabeth Wiley in 1895.

The tree had great significance for the children who lived in the orphanage. Stories have been told that the children would get pennies and hide them in or around the tree to save them for a time when they would run away. They hid behind the tree to be alone in their sadness at being separated from their families. They sometimes



took out their anger or frustration on the tree, knowing it would withstand their emotions. They told the tree the deepest secrets of their young

lives – secrets about people with whom they were angry, unrequited loves, loneliness, and all of the emotions children have and can’t reveal to adults. The children at the orphanage had “the tree.” It was their friend and their confidant. It was also a great source of cool shade on a hot summer day.

Perhaps this is why the old oak tree still stands straight and tall on the Holston Home property. Perhaps it is proud to hold all the secrets that have been entrusted to it. Perhaps it treasures the memories of the many children who trusted it with not only their secrets, but their “treasures.”

Don’t you wish that old tree could talk?
