

Dinner Fundraises For Holston Home

Holston United Methodist Home for Children hosted a benefit dinner Tuesday at its new Christian Life Center at 1014 Wesley Ave.

"This building is paid for," said Kent Bewley, a long-time member of the Holston Home Board of Trustees, who was event emcee. "Every penny you give goes to help these children."

Headquartered in Greeneville, Holston Home helped more than 662 children and their families in 2018-19, providing a variety of services including residential care and group care for more than 60 children, according to information provided by the organization.

President Bradley Williams said contributions to Holston Home "make a difference" in the youths' lives.

Williams said "over 80% of them go on to college and technical schools," based upon statistics over the past four years.

"Our kids may never know your name, but your giving will make a difference," said Seth Taylor, vice president of development. "This ministry is provided by generosity of friends like you."
