Holston United Methodist Home for Children provides hope and healing for a brighter future by sharing the love of Jesus with children and families struggling with life's challenges.

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You may have heard the song, "The Blessing," based on a compilation of blessings, prayers, and promises found in scripture. I find it to be so encouraging to reflect on the Lord's heart for each of us. One of the bridges is:

*May his favor be upon you / And a thousand generations
And your family and your children / And their children, and their children*

The lyrics are based on, "But the lovingkindness of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear Him. And His righteousness to children's children, to those who keep His covenant and remember His precepts to do them." (Psalm 103:17-18).

Over the last few months, I am so excited as I see more and more parents attend our Sunday services at The Rock and worship with their children who are living here. A few weeks ago, at the end of service, Pastor Abel asked anyone having something on their heart for which they wanted prayer to stand up. As different youth and adults began to stand up, I felt moved to go and pray for a father that had been attending for many weeks with his daughter, Christy. The father, Mark, shared that he had a history of alcoholism and that he had been doing well for a good while but had relapsed last week. He began to cry, and Christy started crying also. This was a problem contributing to why they are not able to live together. Mark was so sorry, and Christy was so discouraged on one hand but so hopeful and forgiving on the other.

Despite having a clinical background and a lot of experience with these kinds of family situations, I just got to be a compassionate friend in church that had the privilege to look like Jesus. We hugged, prayed, wept, and just stood in that tender holy moment! Later I asked their counseling staff about Christy and Mark. They shared that Mark had been honest and reported his relapse taking full responsibility for his decision. Christy was angry but hopeful because she said her dad had never done that before and has always tried to cover up his drinking.

We see that the Lord is changing Mark's heart, healing his and Christy's relationship, and shepherding them down His good path now and for the generations that will follow.

I am so blessed to do what I get to do and see what I get to see. I love to testify of the Lord's amazing goodness and share it with you who pray and give to see life changes happen. Thank you so much! Please know that you are making an eternal difference and

Recently, Matt told our Independent Living Coordinator, Suzanne, about his desire to eventually pursue underwater welding, so Suzanne and Matt began researching schools with underwater welding programs.

Although Matt was excited about the idea of underwater welding, he had never been scuba diving so he really didn't know if the activity would be something he would enjoy which led him and Suzanne to take scuba diving lessons together – two days in class to learn how to dive in the pool and two days deep diving at a rock quarry in Philadelphia, TN. Matt repeatedly practiced setting up his tank, regulator, and buoyancy compensator to make sure he had memorized the many steps. In the water, he had the

time of his life and said it is the #1 thing he has ever done.

Matt is so excited about scuba diving and hopes to attend underwater welding school in Jacksonville, FL after graduation from TCAT!

DONOR SPOTLIGHT

Linda Shoults Keller was born in Burnside Township, Michigan, on the Centennial family dairy farm. In 1962 was chosen Lapeer County “Dairy Princess.” She attended Central Michigan University for two years then graduated from Asbury College (now Asbury University) in 1968 receiving a Bachelor of Arts degree in Christian Education. Following graduation, she served as the Director of Christian Education at Trinity United Methodist Church in Lima, Ohio then moved back to Michigan and worked at Consumers Power Company as the first woman in management.

In 1974, she married Travis A. Keller and three years later they moved to Johnson City, TN, to start a new business, Keller Glasco, Inc. Travis had family roots in East Tennessee, and they wanted to live in a university town which became a blessing to them. Travis passed away in 2013. Linda is a member of Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church in Johnson City, TN.

We recently caught up with Linda and here is an excerpt from our conversation. She was hesitant to be spotlighted but agreed to participate with the hope that others will read this and be inspired to support Holston Home.

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
MAKING A DIFFERENCE

I recently enjoyed a lunch with several former students of Holston Home: Tom Terry, Jerry Long, and Charles Oakes. We talked about days on the farm, playing football, school, and the good training they received at Holston Home. That kind of care and training given to children continues today.

Some children in our care may have been extremely poor and never experienced the life we take for granted. Or perhaps the stress of family and economic problems seemed insurmountable. Perhaps the stress of family breakdown resulted in children being rejected or placed in foster care. The result is low



self-esteem, loss of identity and hopelessness. They lose interest in school and in life itself.

You help by providing children caught in such circumstances a warm, caring place to call home, a school that helps them catch up to where they should be, counselors to help with family and self-esteem issues, good nutrition, clothing, and an opportunity to maximize their God-given potential.

A Glimpse of History

When I observe the children at Holston Home and the ordered day-to-day life on campus, I think about how life was for the children and staff at the beginning of Holston Industrial Home and School. There was apparently a great need for such a home because there is no mention of a shortage of children. Staff was a different matter.

Mrs. Wiley established the Home with her own meager inheritance from her husband, who had been President of Emory and Henry College. She called on her friends in the Holston Conference Women’s Home Mission Society, which raised \$500. No salaries were paid and all workers were volunteers. Mrs. Wiley traveled over the Holston Conference to present the cause of the children, and was never



paid for her expenses. Sometimes when a mother came to leave her child, she was coerced to stay and become a “matron” to care for many children. Every child was assigned a specific task when they weren’t in school. Girls worked indoors and boys worked on the farm. According to one

account, these tasks had to be completed by 8:30 AM and then it was time to go to school. On Sundays the work had to be completed in time for all of the children to walk about a mile to First Methodist Church in Greeneville.

In addition to the original house, a large white frame structure which served as residence and school, other buildings were soon needed. A two-story brick house, to care for the babies, was built in 1900 and an infirmary was soon added, but by 1903 both of these buildings needed to be enlarged.

Haven in the Hills, a published history of Holston Home, is the story of the rapid growth, the struggles and the accomplishments of more than 100 years of child care, its dedicated staff, and the decisions to make changes as they were called for. But one thing remains constant: the dedication of the people of the Holston Conference of the United Methodist Church and the many friends of Holston Home to continue to care for children whose lives are forever changed.
